- Securing and keeping safe the marae, customs, practices

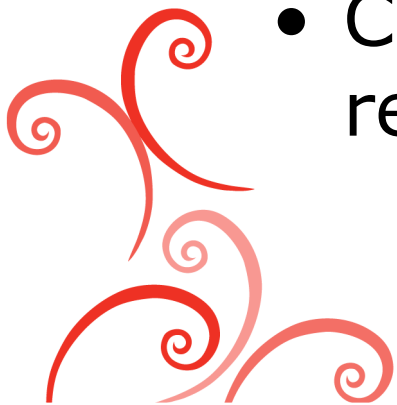

- Balancing individual entitlement with collective accountability
- Holistic grant making in the interests of the recipients vs fragmentation in the interests of the funder
- Connecting = relationships and reciprocity

## Manaakitanga and Rangatiratanga

- Manaakitanga: giving community
  - caring for those who are in and those who come to your community
- Rangatiratanga: thinking community
  - weaving the needs of people to achieve a common goal

What can you do so that Māori can give and think community in Māori terms?
